

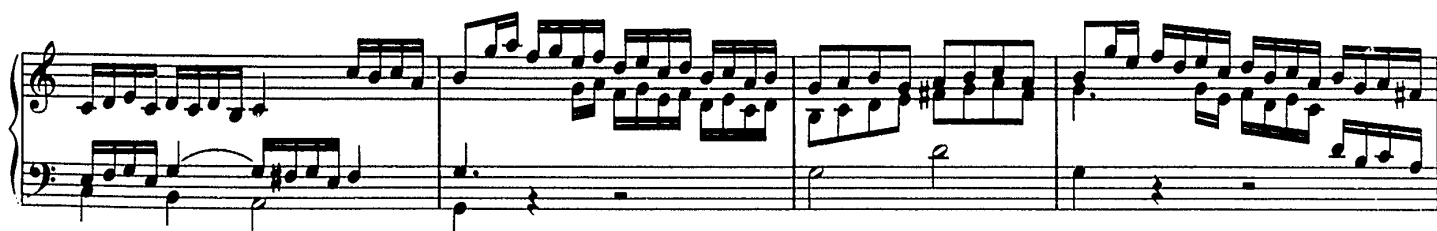
6. PASSAMEZZO.
